Respectfully Sheweth,

That he declared on *Oath* before the Clerk of the Circuit Court of the United States in and for
the Eastern District of Pennsylvania, on this day, that it was bona-fida his intention to become a citizen of
the United States, and to renounce forever all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state
sovereignty whatever, particularly to *the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland*
of whom he has heretofore been a subject, that he is above the age of twenty-
one years; that he enlisted in the ~~Army~~ *Marine* forces, on the
First day of *May* A. D. 1884
and was honorably discharged from the said service on the *First* day of *May*
A. D. 1889 and that he has resided in the United States one year and upwards preceding this his appli-
cation to become a citizen of the United States.

That he has never borne any hereditary title, or been of any of the orders of nobility in his own or any
other country.

He therefore prays, that on his making the proof, and taking the oath prescribed by law, he may be
admitted a citizen of the United States of America.

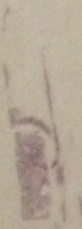

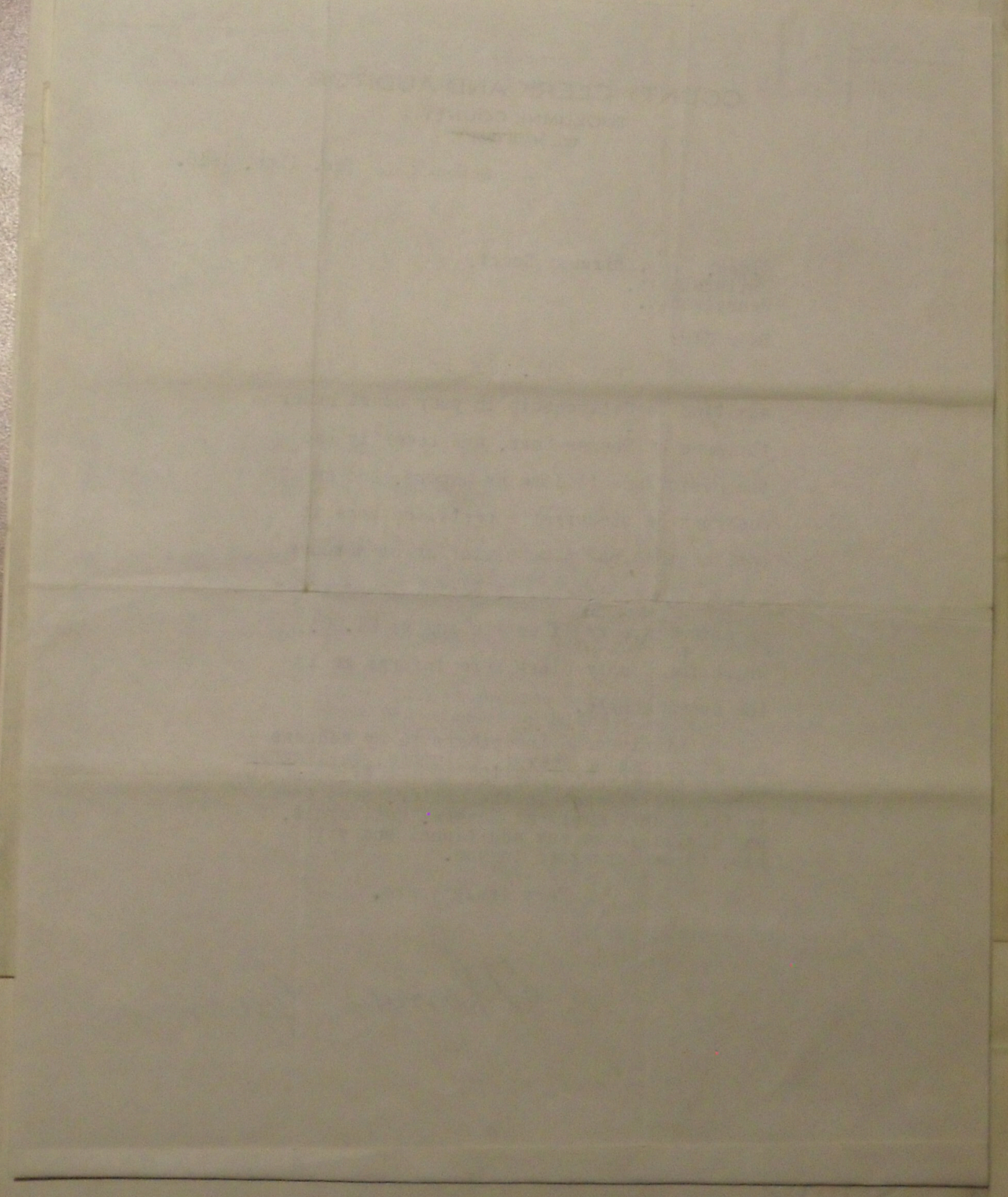
Dear Sir:

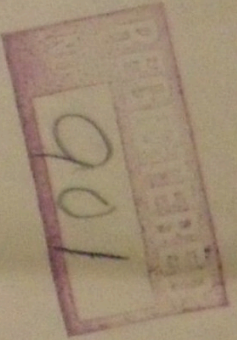

according to law, deposes and says:

That on the _____ day of _____ A. D. _____, he obtained from the Clerk of the ~~District~~ ^{Circuit} Court of the United States for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania, a Certificate of naturalization, admitting to be a citizen of the United States. That said Certificate has been lost or destroyed under the following circumstances: I was working for the City of Los Angeles on their aqueduct, or water conduit for their City water supply, at the Intake about 3/4 miles from Aberdeen Station in Inyo County California, and I had laid my coat upon the ground, when a whirlwind, common to the desert company in that section, in some way blew the paper, among others, from my pocket and carried it away. The Coat was lying open on the ground at the time, and that is how the wind came to snatch it out of the pocket and carry it away. I made diligent search for it, but was unable to find it. I lost the paper the paper in the month of September of the year that the Intake near Aberdeen was finished, but I cannot recall which year it was.

That he has made diligent search for said Certificate and is unable to find the same, and to the best of his knowledge and belief it is not in the possession of any other person for the purpose of committing a fraud under the Naturalization Laws of the United States, either Federal or State.

That if said Certificate should be found he will forthwith return the same to the Clerk of said Court, or if it is known to be in the possession of any other person, and is unable to secure possession of the same, he will at once notify the United States District Attorney of said fact.

That affiant is desirous of exercising his rights as a citizen of the United States and for that purpose now makes application for the issuance of a duplicate Certificate.

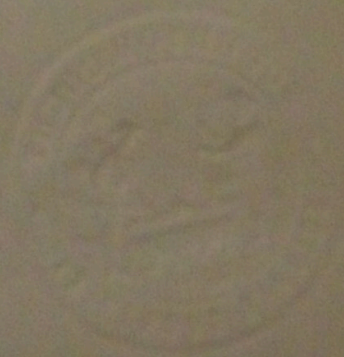
