Upon his solemn oath respectfully declares before this Honorable Court, on this *16* day of *September*, A. D. 189*0*, that he arrived at the Port of *New York* in the State of *New York* on the *17th* day of *April* in the year 18*83*, and that at the time of his arrival he was under eighteen years of age, being *14* years *5* months of age; that he has continued to reside in the United States since that period; that for three years previous to this his application, it was and still is *bona fide* his intention to become a citizen of the United States, and of renouncing forever all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign Prince, Potentate, State or Sovereignty whatever, and particularly to the *Queen of Great Britain and Ireland* of whom he is now a subject. That your Petitioner has resided within the United States upwards of five years, last past, immediately preceding this his application to become a citizen of the United States and one year in the State of Pennsylvania.

That he has never borne any hereditary title, or been of any of the orders of nobility in his own or any other country.

He therefore prays that, on making the proof and taking the oath prescribed by law, he may be admitted a Citizen of the United States of America.

forthwith return the same to the Clerk of said Court, or if it
is known to be in the possession of any other person, and he is
unable to secure possession of the same, he will at once notify
the United States District Attorney of said fact.

That the affiant is desirous of exercising his rights as a
citizen and for that purpose now makes application for the issuance
of a duplicate certificate.
